

American Canoe Association Canoe Sprint Athlete Selection Procedures - 2026 World Cups and World Championships

Date of current version: October 27, 2025

Revised: December 29, 2025, February 10, 2026, February 26, 2026

SECTION 1: OVERVIEW

These procedures outline the pathway for selection to the USA Senior Canoe Sprint Teams for all 2026 international events named within this policy. It also aims to support the longer-term goals of the sprint strategy to 2028.

The focus of National Team Selection is to achieve the best possible performances in our key Olympic events. Our goal is to maximize qualification of quota spots and deliver strong performances leading into and at the 2028 Los Angeles Olympic Games.

Selections will align with and support the targeted events and boat class priorities identified for 2026.

In cases where senior athletes or crews are also eligible for U23 teams, the Selection Committee reserves the right to prioritize competitions and selections to support appropriate periodization and long-term performance planning.

SECTION 2: ATHLETE REQUIREMENTS

1. Nationality/Passports Requirements:

- 1.1. Have a valid US passport at the time of selection that does not expire for six months after the conclusion of the Event.
- 1.2. Non-US passport holders can be nominated for the second entry to any of the World Cup competitions, if they meet the requirements for nomination, and if they are eligible to apply for citizenship by 31 December 2026.

2. ICF requirements:

- 2.1. Abide by the rules of the International Canoe Federation (ICF).
 - 2.2. Comply with all rules and policies implemented by the Local Organizing Committee.
 - 2.3. Each athlete must meet ICF eligibility rules outlined in the ICF Canoe Sprint Competition Rules section 1.3 found here:

 - 2.4. Each athlete must be at least 15-years old by December 31st, 2026.
3. ACA Requirements:
- 3.1. Athlete must have an active ACA competition membership.
 - 3.2. Athlete must be in good standing with ACA at the time of the National Trials and all National and International competitions.
 - 3.3. Comply with the ACA Athlete Agreement.
 - 3.4. Comply with the ACA Athlete Code of Conduct.

 - 3.5. Comply with the ACA SafeSport Policy ([LINK](#)), the ACA MAAPP Policy, and the [U.S. Center for SafeSport Code](#) including education and training requirements.
 - 3.6. Any athlete age 18 or older is required to undergo a background screening in accordance with the current ACA Background Check Policy.
 - 3.7. Athlete does not have an active suspension from the U.S. Center for SafeSport that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Event.
 - 3.8. Athlete does not have an active sanction for an anti-doping rule/policy violation that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Event.
 - 3.9. Athlete meets all health and safety protocols, to include vaccine requirements and/or testing requirements set forth by the government, local laws, USOPC, ICF and/or the Local Organizing Committee.
4. Anti-Doping Requirements:
- 4.1. Agree to be bound by and adhere to all WADA, ICF, USADA and USOPC antidoping protocols, policies and procedures, as applicable. This includes participation in Out-of-Competition Testing and an agreement to be bound to the results management authority of the WADA, ICF, USADA, or other Anti-Doping Organization as applicable.

SECTION 3: EVALUATIVE EVENTS

1. Selection Events

1.1. ACA Sprint National Trial, April 16-17, 2025, Chula Vista, CA

1.2. Team Boat Seat Racing Trial, April 18-19, 2025, Chula Vista, CA

2. Qualification for the events listed in 1.1 and 1.2.

2.1. The 2026 USA Sprint National Team Trials are open to all ACA members meeting the requirements stated in Section 2.

2.2. Athletes will be selected for the Team Boat Seat Racing Trial (days 3 and 4 of the trials) based on performances during the K1/C1 and K2/C2 racing on days 1 and 2. The selection system is described in Section 4.2.

SECTION 4: SELECTION PROCESS

4.1. Competition events:

The selection criteria are intended for selection of teams representing the US / ACA at the following events:

- ICF World Cup 1 (May 8-10, 2026)
- ICF World Cup 2 (May 14-17, 2026)
- ICF World Cup 3 (July 9-12, 2026)
- 2026 ICF Sprint World Championships (August 26-30)

4.2. Selection Process

Structure of the ACA National Sprint Trial

Day 1 and 2 – K1/C1 and K2/C2 events:

Women’s Canoe - C1 200, C1 500, C2 500

Women’s Kayak – K1 200, K1 500, K2 500

Men’s Canoe – C1 200, C1 500, C1 1000, C2 500

Men’s Kayak – K1 200, K1 500, K1 1000, K2 500

Day 3 & 4 - Team Boat Seat Racing

Men’s and Women’s K4

Men’s and Women’s C4 (if applicable)

4.2.1. Kayak Team Selection Process

Women’s K1 Selection Procedure

K1 500m: The winner of the Women's K1 500m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

K1 200m: The winner of the Women's K1 200m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

K1 1000m: The winner of the Women's K1 1000m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

K1 5km: The winner of the Women's K1 5km will be given the opportunity to race the K1 5km at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

Men's K1 Selection Procedure

K1 1000m: The winner of the Men's K1 1000m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

K1 500m: The winner of the Men's K1 500m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

K1 200m: The winner of the Men's K1 200m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

K1 5km: The winner of the Men's K1 5km will be given the opportunity to race the K1 5km at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

Women's K2 Selection Procedure

K2 500m: The winner of the Women's K2 500m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships. The second-place boat can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

Men's K2 Selection Procedure

K2 500m: The winner of the Men's K2 500m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships. The second-place boat can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

K4 Selection Procedure

The same process will be followed for men's kayak and women's kayak. Although athletes are not required to attend all 2026 competitions to be eligible for a team boat, those selected for Olympic-distance team boats are strongly encouraged to participate in all competitions.

The top 2 K2's will be nominated to the team boat pool, if the second K2 is within 5% of the winner.

The top 6 K1's in the K1 500m event will be nominated to the team boat pool, if they finish within 5% of the winner.

If any paddler/K2 declines to be a part of the team boat pool, the next best placed K1/K2 will be included, to have a maximum of 6 paddlers in the pool.

If the paddlers do not meet the 5% threshold, the coaches panel may use discretion to allow for a total pool number of no more than 6 paddlers. If there are only 4 athletes available, then those 4 will be nominated to paddle K4. If fewer than 4 athletes are available, then there will be no K4 racing at the competition events.

Seat Trials Procedure:

The Sprint High Performance Director of the ACA will choose a coach to be the Kayak Selection Lead. The Kayak Selection Lead will facilitate the seat racing and selection process. While the Sprint High Performance Director will invite additional coaches to form the Panel to collaborate, provide insight and support the selection process, the Kayak Selection Lead will make the final decisions on athlete combinations and seat orders.

There will be 3-4 Seat Trials which will be spaced 2 hours apart; all time trials will be videoed and timed. Wind and weather conditions, and feedback from the athletes will be noted.

Seat Trial #1: Top 2 K2's from the K2 500m

Seat Trial #2: Top 4 K1's from the K1 500m

Seat Trial #3: Top K2 and 2 K1's

Seat Trial #4: Coach's discretion

At the conclusion of seat racing, the coaching panel will use the time differences between the boats as well as observations of the athletes' strengths and compatibilities to determine which K4 combination is fastest. The Kayak Selection Lead will provide a written recommendation to the Selection Committee containing the seat racing procedure that was used, the complete results of the seat racing and the identified strengths and compatibility of the athletes. They will present the K4 combination they determine to be the fastest. This boat is the provisional nomination for the K4 events at Senior level races in 2026. They will also provide the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th fastest combinations, supported by similar reasoning and data. Upon approval by the Selection Committee, the provisional K4 will become the official nomination and will be given the right of first refusal to race the K4 event at the 2026 ICF Canoe Sprint World Championships, and 2026 ICF Canoe Sprint World Cups. If the next best K4 is within 3% of the winning time, it will be given the option to race the 2026 World Cups.

4.2.2. Replacement of Kayak Athletes

The replacement procedure will be the same for Men's and Women's kayak.

Replacement of Athletes to the K1 Events

- If the athlete(s) selected to race the K1 200m, K1 500m, K1 1000m or K1 5km declines the opportunity to race at any of the regattas, the next ranked athlete in the qualification event will be given the opportunity to race if they are within 5% of the winner of the corresponding event at the trials.
- If the next ranked athlete is greater than 5%, no one will compete in that event.

Replacement of Athletes to the K2 Events

- If the K2 declines the opportunity to race at any of the regattas, the next ranked boat in the qualification event will be given the opportunity to race if they are within 5% of the winner of the corresponding event at the trials.
- If the next ranked boat is greater than 5%, no one will compete in that event.

Replacement of Athletes to the Selected K4

- If an athlete in the selected K4 declines their position for one of the 2026 events, the next fastest combination will be selected for that event.
- If fewer than four athletes in the team boat pool accept the K4 nomination, there will not be a K4 entered at that event.

4.2.3. Canoe Team Selection Process

Women's C1 Selection Procedure

C1 200m: The winner of the Women's C1 200m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

C1 500m: The winner of the Women's C1 500m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

C1 5km: The winner of the Women's C1 500m will be given the opportunity to race the C1 5km at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

Men's C1 Selection Procedure

C1 1000m: The winner of the Men's C1 1000m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

C1 500m: The winner of the Men's C1 500m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

C1 200m: The winner of the Men's C1 200m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

C1 5km: The winner of the Men's C1 1000m will be given the opportunity to race the C1 5km at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place paddler can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

Women's C2 Selection Procedure

C2 500m: The winner of the Women's C2 500m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place boat can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

Men's C2 Selection Procedure

C2 500m: The winner of the Men's C2 500m will be given the opportunity to race the event at the 2026 World Cups, and the 2026 World Championships.

The second-place boat can race the event at the 2026 World Cups, if they finish within 5% of the winner at the 2026 National Trial.

4.2.4. Replacement of Canoe Athletes

The replacement procedure will be the same for Men's and Women's canoe.

Replacement of Athletes to the C1 Events

- If the athlete selected to race the C1 200m, C1 500m, or C1 1000m declines the opportunity to race at any of the regattas, the next ranked athlete in the qualification event will be given the opportunity to race if they are within 5% of the winner of the corresponding event at the trials.
- If the next ranked athlete is greater than 5%, no one will compete in that event.

Replacement of Athletes to the C2 Events

- If the C2 declines the opportunity to race at any of the regattas, the next ranked boat in the qualification event will be given the opportunity to race if they are within 5% of the winner of the corresponding event at the trials.

4.3. Petition Procedures

The ACA recognizes that extraordinary and unforeseen circumstances may occur which would cause an athlete, otherwise deserving of a spot on the 2026 Team because of their previous competition results, to be unable to participate in the selection process. Therefore, an athlete may be petitioned into the team in accordance with the following petition procedures:

- 4.3.1. Petitions will be considered by the Selection Committee and Coaching Panel for any athlete who was a member of the 2025 World Championships Team.

- 4.3.2. To be considered by the Selection Committee and Coaching Panel, petitions must be submitted in writing to the Sprint High Performance Director as soon as practical after the athlete becomes aware of their inability to participate in the 2026 National Trial, but no later than the start of the 2026 National Trials.
- 4.3.3. The petition must state the specific injury or illness which prohibits the athlete from participating in the competitive process. The petition must be accompanied by an examining physician's statement. The nature and extent of that injury or illness is subject to verification by ACA.
- 4.3.4. Petitions are reviewed by the Selection Committee based on the following factors:
 - Medical clearance and return to play timeline.
 - Current or previous National Team status.
 - Strength of previous competition results - the petitioned athlete has shown past results at National Trials or World Championships.
- 4.3.5. If the petition is successful, the National Coaching staff will determine a fitness evaluation method to determine if the petitioned athlete meets the standard to compete.

Section 5: Discretionary Criteria to Nominate Athletes

5.1 Rationale for utilizing discretionary selection:

Discretionary criteria will be used if there is a situation where athletes do not meet the performance standard to be considered for team boat pools and there are too few athletes to make up the team boat pool.

5.2 Define the discretionary criteria to be used:

The next placed athletes will be considered based on:

- Athlete's past race performances at recent World Cups and World Championships
- Athlete's overall performance at recent training camps
- Athlete's performances in other race distances at the trial
- Athlete's technical skill in different boat classes and seats

5.3 Selection Committee

The committee that will be responsible for making discretionary selections or other decisions and recommendations directly impacting athletes in the selection process.

Committee Name: Canoe Sprint World Championships Selection Committee

- ACA Executive Director
- ACA Sprint High Performance Director
- Athlete Representative

SECTION 6: MANDATORY TRAINING AND/OR COMPETITION

Athletes shall be notified of all National Team training camps and/or competitions on April 19, 2026.

Pre Worlds Training Camp: tentative dates are August 16-24, 2026. All information about the camp will be provided to the National Team at least 30 days before the camp begins.

While waivers for mandatory training will not be unreasonably withheld, all athletes should arrange for appropriate time off from school, work or other obligations in advance of all mandatory training. Waivers will primarily be granted for injury or other similar incapacity or for a personal/family emergency. Requests for a waiver must be submitted in writing to the Sprint High Performance Director as far in advance as possible. A medical waiver is required to be signed by a licensed physician.

SECTION 7: DATE OF TEAM NOMINATION

The Nomination of the USA National Team Athletes will occur directly after the final race of the 2026 Team Boat Seat Racing Trials.

Athletes will accept their nomination by signing the ACA National Team Athlete Agreement and paying their deposit within 24 hours of nomination to the team.

SECTION 8: REMOVAL OF ATHLETES FROM THE TEAM

NGB Jurisdiction

- a. An athlete who is nominated to the Team may be removed for any of the following reasons, as determined by ACA:
 - i. Voluntary withdrawal. Athlete submits a written letter to ACA CEO or Sprint High-Performance Director requesting to voluntarily withdraw from the Team.
 - ii. Injury or illness. A physician (or medical staff) approved by ACA provides certification that the Athlete has a debilitating condition. If Athlete refuses to provide verification of their illness or injury by a physician (or medical staff), their injury will be assumed to be debilitating, and they may be removed from the Team.

- iii. Failure to participate. Athlete does not participate in all Mandatory Training and/or Competition as defined in these procedures.
 - iv. Code of Conduct Violation. Athlete violates the ACA Code of Conduct: <https://americancanoe.org/athletecodeofconduct/>
 - v. Athlete Agreement. Athlete violates a term in their signed ACA Athlete Agreement.
 - vi. Non-compliance. Athlete does not meet the athlete eligibility requirements listed in Section 2 of these selection procedures.
- b. An Athlete may be removed as a nominee to the Team or from the Team if found to have violated WADA, ICF, USADA and/or, the U.S. Center for SafeSport Code and the NGB SafeSport Policy, as applicable.

SECTION 9: REPLACEMENT OF ATHLETES

9.1. Should a replacement be necessary, the procedures outlined in Section 4.2.2 will be used to nominate a replacement athlete in a kayak event, and Section 4.2.4 will be used to nominate a replacement athlete in a canoe event.

9.2. All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Section 2.

SECTION 10: RIGHT TO A HEARING

An athlete who is removed from the Team has the right to a hearing per the NGB's Grievance Policy (<https://americancanoe.org/grievance-process/>) and the USOPC Bylaws (applies only for a Protected Competition), Section 9 (<https://www.usopc.org/governance/dispute-resolution>).

SECTION 11: REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

The following documents are required to be signed by an athlete as a condition of nomination to the Event:

SECTION 12: DISCLAIMERS

These procedures are based on ICF rules and regulations as presently known and understood. Any change in the selection procedures caused by a change in ICF rules and regulations will be distributed to the affected athletes immediately. The selection criteria are based on the latest information available to NGB.

However, the selection criteria are always subject to unforeseen, intervening circumstances, and realistically may not have accounted for every possible contingency. If any force of nature, pandemic, or force majeure, should cause the alteration or cancellation of any of the selection events listed in this document, these selection procedures may require revisions.
