

Certification Criteria

Certification Overview: This whitewater raft guide certification exam is intended to provide evidence of the **minimum** skills required to be a professional raft guide. It is based on national and international industry standards. The Guide Certification Criteria establishes standards in the topics of paddling and/or rowing, identifying hazards & routes in swift current, and an ability to safely captain a whitewater oar or paddle raft with participants. Difficulty levels correspond with the ACA Rafting skills and assessment curriculum of Levels 2 to 5 ranging from class I to IV whitewater.

The ACA guide certification complements any additional required training and or licensing. ACA certified guides must also comply with local, state or federal certification and licensing requirements for raft guides on any given country, state, river, or waterway.

Course Prerequisites: All participants must:

- 1. Acknowledge personal compliance with the ACA Essential Eligibility Criteria (EEC)
- 2. Have an ACA Membership
- 3. Have completed one of the following;
 - a. ACA rafting skills and/or assessment course for desired level of certification or
 - b. Resume & river log documenting equivalent experience.
- 4. Have completed an ACA Swiftwater Rescue course or equivalent within the past three years.
- 5. Have current first aid/CPR

Course Location / Venue: Sections of river appropriate to the level of certification participants are seeking. May not exceed class IV. In consistency with ACA language- L2 is conducted in class I water, L3 is conducted in class II water, L4 is conducted in class III water and L5 is conducted in class IV water. (A rapid class includes rapids at the lower and upper ends of the difficulty range, designated "-" and "+" respectively.)

Examiner: Certified L4 or L5 ACA Raft Instructor, Instructor Trainer or Instructor Trainer Educator with the Guide Certification Examiner Endorsement. (Only L5 examiners can certify guides at L5. Examiners can only certify guides in disciplines [paddle/oar] they are certified as L4 or higher in.)

Course Ratio: 6 students: 1 Instructor; with an additional instructor or qualified assistant the ratio can be 12:2, etc...

Certification Maintenance Requirements:

- Maintain annual ACA membership
- Maintain First Aid, CPR & SWR credentials

Course Content:

The sequence of examination and level of certification should be adjusted to best fit the participant's needs, class location and time allowance.

- Welcome, introductions, paperwork
- Student & instructor course expectations and limitations
- Course itinerary & site logistics
- Review waiver, assumption of risk, challenge by choice, medical disclosure

Exam Checklist:

1. This form can be used for all Guide Certification Exams for Paddle and Oar. Not all tasks are required for both Oar and Paddle and are blacked out if not required.

Appropriate use of language/communication
 Sobriety/ no use of alcohol or drugs

- 2. This form can be used for all Guide Certification Exams for exam levels 2-5. Exams must be given in the appropriate venue. (eg: L4 = class III unless otherwise specified.)
- 3. The exam checklist contains information and tasks required of the guide candidate to pass the exam.
- 4. The exam checklist must be followed to ensure consistency across all exams and levels/classification.
- 5. Each requirement may be demonstrated through action, verbally or written assessments at the discretion of the examiner.

Exam Scoring -

- 1. Successful candidates must pass a minimum of 24 skills at a specific level in the discipline they are being evaluated in (oar/paddle) to receive certification at that level in that discipline.
 - a. More than four fails at any one level with passes at a lower level may qualify for certification at lower level.



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- b. More than four fails without passes at a lower level results in exam failure.
- c. The exam may be re-taken to re-attempt certification or certification at a higher level.
